Religious Education

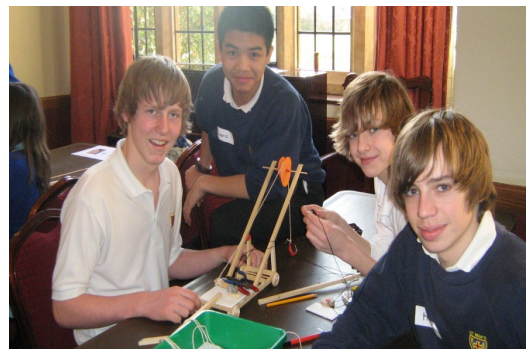

Vocational Education

Rotary Technology Tournament:

On the 8th February, 14 teams of four students from Cambridgeshire schools battled it out in a technology tournament organised by the Rotary Club of Cambridge. They were set a challenge of designing a model crane that would run along a track and pick up a canister containing a purportedly hazardous liquid. St Bede's entered two teams of Year 9 students:

Both teams did exceptionally well and thoroughly enjoyed the challenge, but we were delighted that Team A won the competition! They were presented with their trophy by the Mayor of Cambridge, Councillor Shelia Stuart. All 8 students have also qualified for their Bronze Crest Awards, which are sponsored by the British Science Organisation. We will be presenting them with these shortly.

Toyota Technology Challenge.

Over the last 2 months a team of 5 students, (Nick Brooks, Tom Charter, Nathaniel Harlock, Mark Harris and Ben Wilson) have been working in their lunchtimes to complete the Toyota Technology Challenge. They had to design and build an environmentally friendly solar powered model vehicle by applying knowledge and understanding from a wide range of curriculum subjects including Mathematics and English. The team received a kit containing all the components necessary to build their vehicle and they then made modifications to earn more marks in the competition. They worked very hard, have now submitted their entry and are anxiously awaiting the results.

Stimulus Student

We have been delighted to welcome Matthew Graham, a second year undergraduate student from the University of Cambridge, to work with our Year 10 GCSE Product Design class this term. Matthew is helping the students extend their skills in producing a design brief and developing their ideas.

Cambridge University Press

We were delighted to welcome Gary White from Cambridge University Press recently who gave the Year 10 ICT Option students an excellent presentation about publishing and the role of ICT within the publishing industry. Students were fascinated to discover how the work they do, and tools that they use, in school are used in the 'real world' and had a lot of questions to ask. This will help students as they start on the publishing section of their coursework. Gary White was most impressed with the students and is keen to return to repeat his presentation next year.

Food and Nutrition

Thank you to all parents who have paid the voluntary contribution towards the ingredients needed for practical Food and Nutrition lessons. The comments we have had about this new system have been overwhelmingly positive, with many parents very grateful that they are not having to run around late on a Sunday evening and find small amounts of a key ingredient! The benefit to students has also been positive with all students always being able to cook and, for the first time, being able to cook with meat and fish which was not possible before. The only problem is that the smells that drift down the corridor to other classes are even more wonderful – especially as it nears lunchtime!

English Speaking Union Competition

The end of January saw St Bede's host the local heat of the annual English Speaking Union competition. Here schools enter teams of three, with one person speaking on a selected topic of their choosing, whilst the other two perform the roles of Chairperson (who introduces proceedings and ensures all is run to the strict timings code), and a Questioner, (whose job is to try and respond to another team's Speech). All in all, the aim of the competition is to encourage young people to meet, discuss, and debate 'heavyweight' issues amongst their peers from other schools.

St Bede's entered two teams. The first, from Year 10, comprised Samantha Calvey, Isabelle Hitchcock and Steven Atkins. Steven delivered a polished and impassioned speech suggesting that 'Mankind needs Religion'. The second team, made up of Tom Williams, Sam Baxter and James Ollerenshaw, all from Year 11, saw Tom argue compellingly against the notion that 'Religion has no place in Schools'.

The evening was a great success and concluded with the Year 11 team seeing off the stiff competition from the Perse and St Mary's schools to earn themselves a place in the Branch Final and a trip to Oakham Castle in Rutland. Here, they faced some slick competition from a number of private schools, including Wellingborough and the Peterborough school. Despite a sterling performance from the team, we ended up placed third. All was not lost though, as James Ollerenshaw was awarded the 'Most Promising Talent' prize on the night, earning himself a book token for his troubles.

Both teams are to be congratulated on the maturity and eloquent manner with which they conducted themselves, and our thanks go to Mr Watts for coordinating the project, and to Ms Edden and Ms Trickey for their help in coaching and supporting the teams through what is now proving to be a very successful event for St Bede's students.

Expressive Arts Faculty News

January saw the Expressive Arts team return and hit the ground running with no less than two dramatic productions, and three nights out at the theatre all undertaken!

Rehearsals for the Upper School adaptation of 'Teachers' continued apace, and we can now reveal that the performances will take place in the Main Hall at St Bede's on Wednesday 9th and Thursday 10th March. Details of how to obtain tickets will be revealed shortly, but with over 40 members of Years 10 and 11 involved, they certainly won't hang around!



Elsewhere, February saw the announcement of this year's huge summer musical, scheduled to take place over three nights at the end of June. The auditions for 'Joseph and his Amazing Technicolour Dreamcoat' saw over 120 people sign up.

Year 11 GCSE Drama groups took in a performance of 'Beachy Head' at the Junction, which combined video and minimalist storytelling techniques to tell the tragic tale of a life unsolved. There was much for all to take away with them, be it thematically or technically, and we hope to see these elements carried over into their class work as they now enter the crucial final performance phase of the course.

Meanwhile, by contrast, the Year 10 Drama and Music groups took in a slightly 'lighter' performance of Michael Frayn's famous farce 'Noises Off!' at the ADC theatre. Over 40 students enjoyed the amusing goings-on back-stage of a theatre company in chaotic decline.

With a Year 9 trip to see West Side Story already lined up for March, and the annual GCSE Drama parents' performance nights in April to look forward to, it seems that rarely does a month go by at St Bede's without some form of expressive outlet being made available to our students. Our thanks go to Mr Watts, Mr Wright and Miss Bell for organising and arranging all these trips and activities, and to Mrs Ridgman, Miss Le Scelle, Miss Cleary and all the other teachers who give up their time to accompany them.

Faith and Worship

January 27th is the date, in 1945, when the largest Nazi death camp, Auschwitz-Birkenau, was liberated by Soviet troops. The date was chosen to become International Holocaust Memorial Day and we commemorated not just the day, but the whole week, in a series of assemblies led by Year 9 RE classes. Over the course of the week, we heard stories of heroic individuals such as Corrie ten-Boom, Max Kolbe and Oscar Schindler, we reflected on how their lives and actions can be an inspiration to us and how we can learn about our own faith from them. On Holocaust Memorial Day, we heard other true stories of those who survived and those who lost their lives in the death camps of Nazi Europe, as well as in genocides in other parts of the world and in more recent history. The assemblies were powerful and deeply moving, thoughtfully put together by students with the help of their teachers.

Assemblies, along with tutor group Collective Worship provide the pattern and rhythm of our worship as a school community. Our assemblies are led by staff and students, but we are also indebted to our local clergy who regularly give up their time to come and lead us in worship and reflection. The worship group have continued to be involved in leading assemblies for Lower School, and regularly lead us in singing traditional and contemporary worship songs. We are so grateful for the way they give so freely of their time and talent.

For our Year 11 Reflection Day we began our day in a celebration of the Eucharist focussing on our theme for the day 'Being Human'. Coaches took us into central Cambridge where, between three venues, we heard three different presentations on our theme. At St Andrew's St Baptist Church, the Youth for Christ Team, headed by Liz Currie, encouraged us to consider aspects of character on ourselves and in celebrity examples. We looked at the life, work and motivation of heroes such as Mother Theresa, Martin Luther King and Bob Geldof. Students were encouraged to work in teams and contributed thoughtful mature suggestions to the group discussion.

At Emmanuel URC, Rev Barry Linney talked to us using examples from films about some of the aspects of our emotional lives that make us human. If a robot can be programmed to cry is this the same as real emotions? We were challenged to think about what we value and what difference Love make to our lives.

Speaking from OLEM church Rev Stephen Leeke took us on a visual journey through his slideshow of teaching about the skill of the Weaver Bird to the story of Lech Wałęsa! He challenged us to consider our own lives in the context of the incredible potential that each one of us has, and encouraged us to keep open minds to how our future might unfold. We are very grateful to all those who helped to make the day so challenging, thoughtful and enjoyable.
