The Expressive Arts Day - Yet another triumph by the Expressive Arts students at St Bede's. Bring me sunshine, bring me laughter, and bring me joy. The Expressive Arts department brought all of this and more. As friends, family and staff were entertained by the many events that unfolded the talent, creativity and sheer hard work of our students shone through.

Art & Textiles The GCSE art & textiles department put on another successful exhibition, showcasing the incredible creativity of the Y11 cohort. The skill and dedication evident in their artwork was truly inspiring.

Design and Technology Year 9 displayed facts about the impact of fast fashion. A shocking fact was the weight of global textile waste a year - weighing more than the weight of all people in Europe. This sparked many conversations with visitors about ethics and sustainability. Year 10 displayed the models and prototypes for their lights from cardboard model to finished product. Students were encouraged to hear from visitors how similar their process is to engineering design processes. The GCSE coursework projects ranged from products to help Alzheimer's patients to a phonics education resources.





Any contributions to the display can be brought to the textiles room in September for staff to assemble.



Gardening Club

The school's Gardening Club, supported by a small group of very enthusiastic students keen to learn the basics of gardening while enhancing the school environment, have had a busy and varied year.



The beginning of the academic year saw us planting spring bulbs in two of the three central flowerbeds in the school. We were rewarded with a lovely display of daffodils and tulips in the spring, and more recently by a lovely display of sunflowers, which we grew from seed.

The end of the winter term saw us clearing an area for a wildlife garden, a feature the students were keen to have in in school. Thankfully, by the help of some mechanical assistance, a dedicated area was cleared and we were able to broadcast wildflower seeds such as ox-eye daisy, corn poppy, cornflower and corn marigold. Thankfully, despite the very dry spring and the recent very warm temperatures, the wildflowers have emerged. These over time will form a beautiful haven for pollinators and insects.



During the year, we were delighted to receive our Level 3 School Gardening Award from the RHS, which recognises our efforts in enhancing the school's surroundings.

We propagated plants from seed, cuttings and by division for a Plants' Sale at the beginning of the summer term. The sale raised c.£330, which will be used to support both the PTFA and the club's future activities.

A big thank to the delightful members of the Gardening Club and to parents and staff in supporting us.

This year saw the initiation of the Young Leaders' Award programme at St Bede's. The programme aims to help students grow in confidence through teamwork and empowering them to serve in their communities.

Y10 Geography trip

Year 10 students had a very successful day on their GCSE human geography fieldtrip, investigating the impacts of visitor flows on Cambridge.

Below is a summary of the day, written by Alex Sanders (10CS-LMA):

For our Year 10 Geography fieldwork trip, we took a trip into central Cambridge, assessing how cycles and flows of people affect the City Centre. We stopped a few times on the way, to do a traffic count, environmental quality survey, and an emotion map. Once we arrived in the City Centre, we completed a survey, where we asked a few questions to people related on how tourism affects the city. Overall, it was a very fun and interesting day, where we also learnt more about our city as well.





History: The Tower of London Trip

Students in Year 10 visited the Tower of London to examine the historical site as part of their GCSE History studies. It was a fun and informative day where students started the day with a detailed tour of the site, followed by group work studying specific architectural features of the site and collecting photographic evidence for their projects. Students also visited the ceramic poppy display commemorating the 80th anniversary of the end of World War II.



Murray Edwards Art Trip

Our Year Nine GCSE Art trip was to Murray Edwards, a college in Cambridge that is home to one of the largest collections of women's art in the world. The building itself is fairly modern and designed so that you can see the art in the corridor opposite where you are standing through the glass and across the moving body of water in the courtyard. We arrived at around 9:45 and received a tour from Harriet Loffler, who is the curator that works there. She told us the history of the college as well as when the art collection was established and stories behind pieces of art that have particular significance to the college. For example, she mentioned the president of the college in 1991 was writing to individual woman artists to ask if they were able to donate a work to Murray Edwards, which was known as New Hall at the time. Even now, Murray Edwards is expanding their art collection, still restricting to art by woman artists.

Harriet gave us access to rooms that you would not normally be able to enter if you went as a student at the college or if you were visiting with family. This meant that we had to opportunity to explore the Fellow's gardens from which you could see the dome on top of the dining hall. After the gardens, we could go into the Fellow's Room, which displayed even more artwork. Towards the end of the tour, Harriet told us about the exhibition that is currently on in the college called 'Looking at her' which explores how women see and portray themselves through their art. This exhibition is mostly items that are always in college but also artwork that is on loan.

After the tour, we were able to make our own way around the college, which was quite simple to navigate. This meant that we could come back to artworks that we especially liked and could take as much time as we want looking at them. We explored with friends at our own paces, and we took pictures along the way to include on a page that we will create about the trip. Once we felt satisfied with our exploration, we selected works of art that we would like to copy and were given the chance to sit down in front of it rather than just a photo of it so that we could look at it in detail. We all sat down and did this for the rest of the time we had before returning to school in order to get back in time for lunch.
